Altogether, it is a very baffling situation, and it is very difficult to know what should be done about it. Personally, I have a suspicion that events will move faster than the minds of statesmen.

They laid in New Zealand the foundations for the building up of a nation and a country which to-day can offer, whether to her own children returning or to the stranger from abroad, a landfall with few rivals the wide world over.

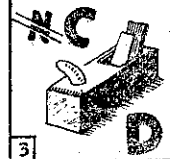
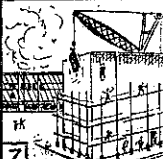
