Additional interest will also be lent these talks by mystery teasers in the form-of conundrums surrounding motoring generally. These talks are scheduled from 2UW for Wednesday nights, at 1.1 p.m. (N.Z.M.T.), and on Sunday morning from 11 o'clock to 11.30. Mr. Maxwell is a former executive of the motor trade in New South Wales, and knows all the ramifications of the motor business in the State. He is therefore in a position to give hints of real guidance and of service in all matters pertaining to the car. He will be glad to receive letters, and wants listeners to realise that this session is meant to be of genuine service to any motorist who cares to ask his advice.

PORT MORESBY is to have its own broadcasting station, the equipment having been dispatched a week or so ago from Sydney by Amalgamated Wireless (Australasia) Limited. Residents of Papua and the mandated territory will thus be able to hear radio programmes without excessive atmospheric interference. The new station to be known as 4PM, will be conducted by A.W.A., by which company the plant was designed and manufactured. The transmitter is of the latest high fidelity type, and will have a power of 100 watts in the aerial, operating on a wavelength of 221 metres. The Port Moresby station will be the first broadcaster in the South Pacific Islands.


## FRENCH LESSONS


