With the decay of the central Roman power in the 3rd century A.D., the erosion of the western and northern frontiers of the empire began. In 236 A.D., the Franks were breaking bounds upon the Lower Rhine, and another of the Germanic tribes, the Alamanni, was pouring into Alsace.

The most serious threat, however, came from the Goths in the north. After obtaining command of the eastern seas, these virile barbarians raided Greece; and crossing the Danube in 247 A.D., defeated and killed the Emperor Decius in what is now Serbia. With this reverse the province of Decia vanished from Roman history.
