## Radio Round The World

MR. ELLIOT ROOSEVELT, son of the President, has become vicepresident of Hearst Radio Inc., which controls eight broadcasting stations, in spite of the fact that Hearst is one of the bitterest critics of his father's administration. PROTESTANT Synod at Dordrecht, Holland, which governs a number of Congregational churches in the district, considered the case of a married couple who confessed to owning a radio set, and to listening to sermons on it. 'The Elders of the church had told them that this was wrong, and the married couple had asked for a Biblical authority. The Elders found none, and referred the mat-ter to the synod. The synod found that broadcasting was not so much to be condemned in itself, as for its use as a disseminator of sermons, radio being "more in the service of false doctrine than Church members, said the synod, true." must either attend services regularly or study the writings of the Fathers in their'. own homes, and as to the married couple, their admission to church membership was to be postponed for six months.
