IN the course of a report recently submitted to the Federal Communications Commission by American broadcasting engineers, it is proposed that 25 new super-power stations be erected in suitable parts of the country, and that the power of existing stations be considerably increased. Furthermore, an extension of the wave-band allotted to broadcasting is suggested in order to allow for a great increase in the number of broadcasting stations.
