

That casually-knotted neck-tie of navy or some other contrasting collar is a clever touch, and the little turn-back collar is most becoming.

REFORE filling a garden tub with soil, attach to the bottom of the tub two pairs of the small iron wheels usually placed on boys' hand-carts.
