

So we may be most truly thankful to him:... As a general rule a subject which needs great length is not a suitable screen subject, while to give a normal subject great length means it is either bloated or incompetent. It was time that somebody stopped this competitive million-dollar meandering. It is fitting that M-G-M, who first launched length as a bold experiment should be the first to see that it must not become a habit."
