IT is interesting to note that the chief announcer at the temporary 1-k.w. shortwave station at Addis Ababa is a woman, Signorina Luisa Gasparini. OMITTING pirates, the BBC now estimates that the potential listener audience is approximately 31,000,000. The figure is based on the total number of wireless licences (3,609,800) multiplied by the size of the average household, i.e., 3.6 persons.
