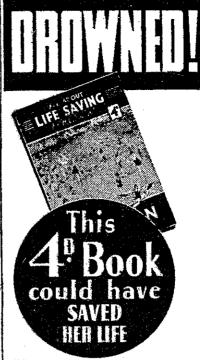

Definitely an experiment, this broadcast was interesting, entertaining and most effective. On the organ was played an adaptation of the orchestral parts. The performance was highly successful, although probably the puriet would miss the orchestral colour. In the slow movement, however, the most successful, the organ attained a remarkably good imitation of the string tones. It was a novelty that was not cheap or trashy, and this serious attempt would stand repetition again in the near future.

I have always admired the performances given by the Dunedia Returned Soldiers' Choir. It is always entertaining, always worth listening to. Unlike many similar choirs, it knows its limitations.

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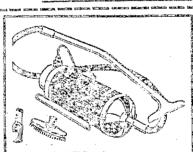
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
