## Aeroplane Radio

### N.Z. Enterprise

 $\mathbf{A}^{\mathbf{N}}$  interesting and unique experiment took place at the Auckland Aero Club's base on Wednesday morning last, when, as far as is known, the first short-wave transmission in New Zealand from a 'plane in flight was

With the object of testing out a portable transmitter-receiver for the use of Captain Hewitt on his proposed Dunedin to Auckland non-stop flight, Messrs. Abel, Smeeton, Ltd., in conjunction with the Aero Club officials and the P. and T. Department, carried out a test transmission using a three-valve transmitter with an input of 3 watts, operating on a wavelength of 36 metres. The set, which was designed and built by Mr. J. H. Trenwith (ZLIFX) is housed in a box 81 inches x 15 5-8 inches x 10 inches, outside measurement, and includes transmitter and receiver, batteries, valves, phones, key and aerial equipment, weighs just 19lb. It can be used for either Morse or telephony transmission and receiving, a very ingenious switching arrangement giving "Key," "Off," "Mike," and receiver connections.

ON actual test, using an aerial and counterpoise strung from the wing tips to the tail of the 'plane, Mr. Trenwith, using the call sign ZKAAR, connected ZLW on good readable strength. Unfortunately just as the 'plane left the ground one of the two parallel audio valves went out, reducing the output to only .3 watt.

As a result of this test it can now be definitely stated that it is possible for Captain Hewitt to keep in touch with the ground throughout the whole of his flight.

To show the efficiency of this small set, it has only to be realised that this test gave a range of 1330 miles per watt of output—no mean achievement. The altitude of the 'plane varied up to 5400ft.

Mr. Trenwith, prior to this test and transmitting from his station ZLIFX, has been successful in working Christchurch on more than one occasion, and is continuing his experiments with the object of attaining even greater efficiency.



> WHEN visiting the new Government air base at Hobsonville last week, "Call Up" was interested to learn that all the Air Force 'planes there are fitted with radio transmitting apparatus. The Gipsy Moth has a small transmitter which can be operated from either cockpit, and which has been used frequently. The two big Fairey machines are fitted with old war-time design transmitters which work on a wavelength of 1400 metres. These two transmitters had just been set up and were about to be tested.

> IN pursuance of their policy of devoting special nights to the works of individual composers, 1YA are giving a Brahms night on May 9, and a Wagner night on May 20, those being the nearest available dates to t anniversaries of the respective births of these composers.

> A RRANGEMENTS were made by which 20,000 Auckland school children listened in to Admiral Byrd when he spoke in Dunedin last Tuesday afternoon. North Shore pupils assembled at the Takapuna racecourse, city schools at the Domain, and children from the eastern and western suburbs at the Training College, Epsom, and the Western Springs Stadium respec-tively. The Auckland Radio Dealers' Association and the Education Board also made arrangements for the children at schools in the outer suburbs to listen-in, the dealers going to a lot of trouble and considerable expense to install sets.

> Unfortunately the reception was very disappointing, particularly when Admiral Byrd was speaking.
