### 4YA to Broadcast "Cairo"

#### A Famous Stage Success

THE principal feature attraction at 4YA next week will be the presentation of "Cairo," that "mosaic in Eastern music and mime" made famous by Oscar Asche. "Cairo" is an exceptionally fine play, and contains some beautiful descriptive music, true to the Orient. The radio presentation on Monday, March 31, will be given by the Majors Quartet, assisted by Miss Tui Northey and Miss Ethel Wallace. During the presentation Miss Northey will take the character of Sharazad and will relate the story of the play against a background of incidental music. She will also recite the famous "Dance Poem" of Sharazad, which occurs in the second act. This is accompanied by most sympathetic music. The dulcitone will be introduced for this occasion, and on it will be played the dance numbers occurring in the piece. This play will last for an hour and a half. All the vocal items in "Cairo" will be presented, and most of the instrumental ones.
