## Identification Wanted

ON October 21 I heard a rather weak station which was fading consid-

erably on approximately 680 k.c. (441 metres). The announcer spoke in a low voice, apparently not giving the call sign. At the end of each item he would say, for example, "That was number 2; now we will have number 40." For the most part a man was singing. Heard between 8 and 8.15 p.m.—"Jason" (Gisborne).

On October 17 stations were heard on 2YA and 1YA's frequencies. On the former the clock was chiming 9 p.m. (New Zealand time 11.30 p.m.). Static obliterated letters and call, but "Adelaide" was heard. The other was on music. Also, on October 19, a station was heard five metres below 2BL on jazz music and singing—"New Ohum" (Southland).

[The former was probably 5CL, Adelaide, on 412 metres (780 k.c.).—Ed.]

On several nights recently station midway between 4YA and 2YA (former 100 and latter 97). Also on Sunday afternoons at about 5 p.m. an American on 2BL's frequency and another on 2LO's frequency—"Sparks" (Christchurch).

Foreigner heard half a degree above W2XAF on October 18—J.C. (N.P.).

Station broadcasting dance music between 6.45 p.m. and 7.30 p.m. on 2UE's frequency on October 19. Static drowned call signs, but the last two letters sounded like YW—"Shorty" (Wellington).

American on KFKD's frequency at 11.30 p.m. on October 18. A man was giving a lecture on the laws and customs of a certain sect of people. "Day of Jubilee" and "All land goes back to the original owners on the day of Jubilee" were phrases often used. Organ music followed—"Jaka" (Haitai).

At 11.55 p.m. on October 12 station almost on 4ZL. A man was talking. Mr. Fitzgerald being mentioned. At 12 p.m. the latter spoke. At 12.10 a.m. National Anthem was played. Call sounded like 3CR. On the 13th, at 12.30 a.m. dials nearly the same. 12.45, lady speaking; 12.55, man singing; 1 a.m., three fox-trots and then the announcement—EF. On October 15, 7.55 p.m., between 2YB and 4ZL, station on old-time songs; also at 7.40 p.m. one degree above 2ZI man singing, followed by band selections, and then violin and piano solos.—"Clematis" (Raurimu).

Station on 25.4 metres heard testing recently. Comes in well at R9 with records and talk and generally calls "Uilo, uilo, Torquay, here is Saigon." The announcer kept repeating a message one evening and stated they would be listening for a reply on 7880 k.c. At 11.45 p.m. I heard a call given as CZMH. I was not quite sure of the first letter.—A. D. Rogers (Wellington).

Between 10 and 10.30 p.m. on October 20 station on about 27 metres. "Indian Love Call" and "Wedding of the Painted Doll" were heard at R7-S. The only call I heard was "Hullo, Tokio," with a very foreign accent—"Jehu" (Gisborne).

Station heterodyning 3AR on 486

metres (618 k.c.) at about 8 p.m., October 11. Another on 210 metres (1430 k.c.) on October 12 at 10.30 p.m. Probably an Australian. Another on 230 metres (1800 k.c.) October 14 and 6.30 p.m. American announcer.—R.J.R. (P.N.).

## Stations Identified

"RIDLEY" (Pakaraka): Station near 2YB probably VK3BF, Ellwood, H.E.M. (Dunedin): 1ZB, Auckland.—B.W. (Stratford).

German station on 26 metres is probably BHC, Nauen, Germany. Broadcasts occasionally when conditions are good.—J.C. (N.P.).

Crystal-One-Valve (Auckland): 2GB, Sydney—"Jaka" (Wellington).

"Amuri" (Invercargill): One degree above KGO is KCM, Los Angeles. Station giving by-election results, 4ZI, Batchelor's Radio Service, Invercargill.—J.R.W. (Invercargill).

"Bob" (Wellington): Station on 243 metres is 2YB (N.P.). On 258 metres 4ZP, Invercargill. His closing record is "When You Come to the End of the Day." "Kaukoki" (Murchison): 2ZP, Wairoa. Station just below 3LO is JODK, Keijo. 5AD, Adelaide, is a new Australian "B" class on 229 metres (1810 k.c.).—"Keijo" (Invercargill).

"Jaka" (Haitaitai): Station three degrees below 4QG, probably WBBM, Chicago. W.J.S. (Waiata): 1ZH's frequency is 630 k.c. (479.5 metres).—(Christchurch): Station one degree above KGO is KGM, Los Angeles.—"Metre" (Huntly).

J.C. (N.P.): VK2JF, Mr. J. Fraser, North Street, Quirindi, N.S.W. Uses 10 watts input, and is received here at R9.—A. D. Rogers (Wellington).

Station heard on 58 metres by Mr. Sellens is most likely PMY, Bandoeng, Java.—J.C. (N.P.).

### Schedule of W3XAL.

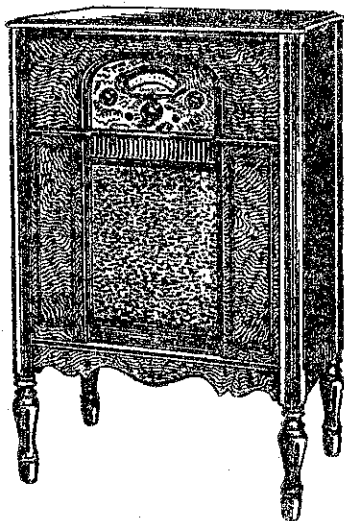
THE following is an extract from a letter from the N.B.C. of America re station W3XAL—"Jehu" (Gisborne).

"W3XAL is on the air daily with the exception of Sunday from 5 to 6 p.m. and between 11 p.m. and 1 a.m., E.D.S.T., which is to be changed to Eastern Standard Time (or one hour earlier), on September 27 at midnight. Occasionally afternoon broadcasts of special interest and early morning test programmes are made, but at the present time no definite schedule has been compiled for these presentations."
