Dunedin Topics

THE talk to be given at 4YA this afternoon by the Home Science Extension Department of Otago University will be on "Fruit Preserving." At 7.30 p.m. Mr. L. W. McCaskill will review the January issue of the Journal of Agriculture. The popular studio trio makes its reappearance this evening after vacation, and two very popular artists in Miss Anita Winkel and Major Lampen, the Winkel-Lampen Radio Players, will be heard. These two artists will present sketches from Sheridan's "School for Scandal" and Lester's "A Restaurant Episode." Opening the evening's programme, which will be of a classical nature, will be a particularly fine orchestral recording of "Autumn" from "The Seasons Ballet," by Glazounov, the Russian composer.

For enjoyable concerted singing there is very little to equal male part voices, and 1YA is very fortunate in obtaining the services of such a fine combination.

THE Wellington Artillery Band, under the conductorship of Captain T. Herd, V.D., will give an excellent studio concert. The band items are of a varied and interesting nature.

The Ariel Singers, already well known to 2YA audiences, will be heard in a number of quartets, duets, and solos. Featured on the programme will be Miss Lillian Frith (mezzo-soprano), a visitor to Wellington, who has recently returned from Australia. During the time spent there she appeared with great success at 2FC and 2BL, Sydney. Her items will include two Maori songs. This will be her final appearance before her departure for other lands.

Christchurch Notes

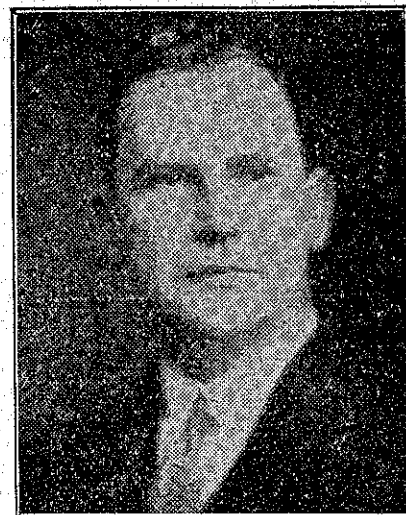
THE 3YA "Radio Service" will be given by Mr. D. Cossgrove and Mr. W. Melbourne.
