

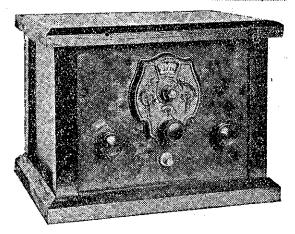



Melt the solder from the pins of the valve base, and having cleared away the insulation from the portions of the coil ends that will touch the pins, pass the wires through and push the valve base into position.
