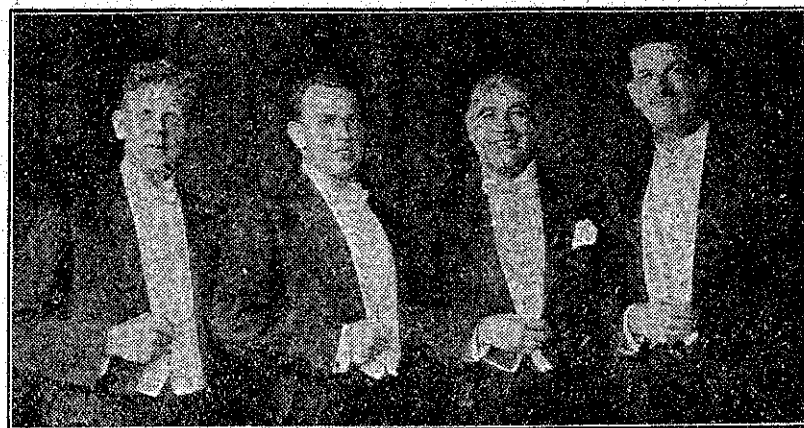
THURSDAY
