one suggested he would like to do it as a "waltz," but as I could not imagine monks waltzing in a monastery garden, I said, "No, thank you," and departed without the expected advance "on account of royalty."

The next publisher suggested that he would like to do it if I would cut out the "Kyrie" part, which he was sure would ruin any chances of popularity the piece might have. To omit this section seemed to me to savour of "Hamlet" without the Prince of Denmark, so I regretfully again said "No, thank you," and again departed

empty-handed.

Then, after a while the present publisher of "In a Monastery Garden" got in touch with me, and as he did not suggest putting in a cake-walk in-stead of the "Kyrie" we came to terms and the piece was at long last published in the form I had written it. My friend's verdict, in due course, was thoroughly verified and the piece became one of the best-hated (or best loved—as you will)—and "best sell-ers," and I passed from the doubtful position of a "promising musician" to that of a "successful composer!"
