## Radio Maroc, Rabot, Morocco.

THE Radio Maroc (Rabot) broadcasts are re-transmitted every Monday by the new 9 kilowatt Maroc-France shortwave station between 12 and 1.30 a.m. N.Z.T. on 23.8 metres, and between 7.30 a.m. and 9.30 a.m. on 32.26 metres.
