

Taxing American Listeners

Attempt Fails

AN important legal precedent has just been established in American radio ing the same exciting experiences law by the decision of a Federal Court. The Court was called upon to test the validity of a law passed last year by the State of South Carolina providing for a graduated wireless tax on wireless sets. This was the first law passed. the use of the police, the Department in the United States attempting to raise was equipped with a patrol car of some revenue by this means. It proposed to levy all owners of receiving sets in South Carolina an annual tax rising progressively to a maximum of 3.50 dollars (10s.) per set.

The Federal District Court for the Eastern District of South Carolina held that the law was unconstitutional, as being an interference with inter-State commerce (which is under the jurisdiction of the Federal Government) and could not, therefore, be enforced. It held that Station WBT, a party to the action, was engaged in inter-State commerce, as its programmes are received beyond the confines of its State of domicile.

A decree was granted restraining the collection of the proposed tax on receiving sets. A special Court, consisting of three judges, heard the arguments of counsel. The action was brought by Station WBT, of Charlotte, North Carolina, a retail wireless dealer, and a broadcast listener.
