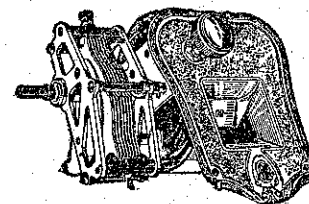
Sunday, May 24: The Children's Choir who will sing this evening is from St. John's Presbyterian Church, and the service will be conducted by Uncle George.
