SUNDAY From Auckland

DURING the afternoon listeners will hear some of the numbers to be played by Mr. Maughan Barnett, city organist, in the Auckland Town Hall. The divine service from St. Matthew's Church will be relayed at 7 p.m., the preacher being Canon Grant Cowan, and the organist and choirmaster Mr. J. H. Philippott. After the service a studio concert will be presented, during which two quartets will appear, the Savoy Male Quartet and the Whisker Instrumental Quartet. Both these combinations are already well known for their artistic performances.

Notes from Wellington

THE evening service in the Vivian Street Church of Christ will be relayed. The preacher will be Pastor W. G. Carpenter, and the organist Miss Hazel Hunter. At 8.15 p.m. a concert by the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve Band, under the conductorship of Mr. Harry Baker, will be relayed from the de Luxe Theatre.

3YA Items

THE service in Durham Street Methodist Church will be broadcast, the preacher being the Rev. P. N. Knight, the choirmaster and organist Mr. A. Wellbrook, L.A.B. 4YA's studio concert will be broadcast at the conclusion of the service.

Notes from Wellington

The "Musical Portrait" series at 2YA will be continued by Bernard Page, who, with Leon de Mauny, will present Leken's "Sonata in G Major" (for piano and violin), a work of singular beauty.

Leken was born in 1870 and died at the early age of twenty-four. Listeners are assured of an outstanding performance in the rendition of this work. Merle Miller, mezzo-soprano from Christchurch, will be heard in the beautiful "Agnus Dei" and "In the Silence of the Night," as well as in two of Schubert's songs. Ernest Short's numbers will include Schubert's "Erl King" and Homer's rather gruesome song, "The Pauper's Drive."

3YA Programme

TO-NIGHT will be "Port Lyttelton Night," an entertainment entirely of a nautical nature.

During the evening the station will switch over to the Lyttelton Borough Council table, where the Mayor, Mr. F. E. Sutton, will be presiding at a meeting. The meeting will be interrupted while Mr. Sutton addresses radio listeners on "Port Lyttelton—Past and Present." One of the contributors to the musical programme will be Myra Sutton, daughter of the Mayor.

Dunedin Topics

A TALK on "The Stock Exchange" will be broadcast by Mr. L. Malcolm, a member of the Dunedin Stock Exchange. The speaker for the International Programme will be the Rev. H. Davies, M.A., speaking on "China and her international relations." Mr Davies is a missionary who has spent many years in China and is at present on furlough.

TUESDAY 1YA Items

THE speaker on the international programme at 1YA will be Dr. E. P. Neale, secretary of the Auckland Chamber of Commerce. His subject is "Some Aspects of International Trade."

Notes from 2YA

THE concert will be of the popular type. The Melodie Four will delight listeners with an excellent selection of solos and quartets, outstanding among which will be two solos by Sam Duncan, tenor, "Macushla" and "Passing By." Notes from Auckland

THE community-singing will be relayed from the Auckland Town Hall at 12.30 p.m. Under the auspices of the Department of Health, Dr. A. Henderson will speak from 1YA, the subject being, "What to do till the Doctor Comes."

Two new artists on 1YA's programme, Mrs. J. S. Smith, a very fine soprano with English training, and W. H. Harvey, bass, a former member of the Christchurch Cathedral Choir. Sid Sly, the new trombonist of the 1YA Orchestra, will play, with orchestral accompaniment, Schubert's beautiful song, "Am Meer."

Recently, the 1YA Musical and Dramatic Advisory Committee recommended the broadcasting of a series of illustrated musical lectures, and on this programme Mr. H. Hollinrake, Mus. Bach, M.A., Director of Music at the Auckland Training College, and of the W.E.A., will talk on the instruments of the orchestra, taking the violin and the viola.

These talks are designed for those who wish to enjoy to the full this particular branch of entertainment. Instrumental items will be given by the 1YA Orchestra, under the direction of Harold Baxter.
