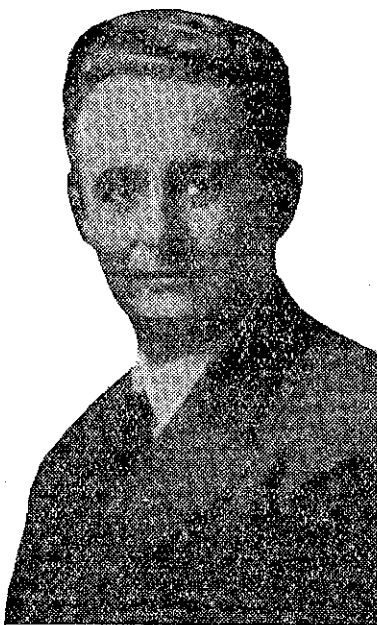
From Auckland

musical director. As in the production of "A Country Girl," an excellent cast has been selected.

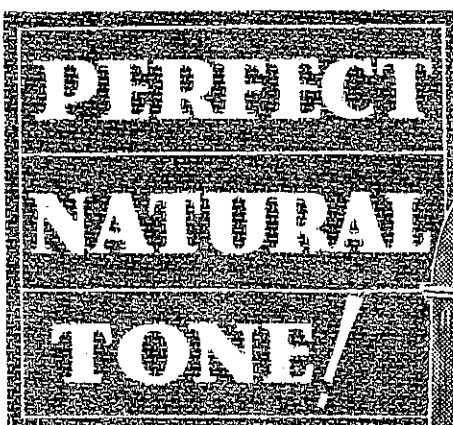

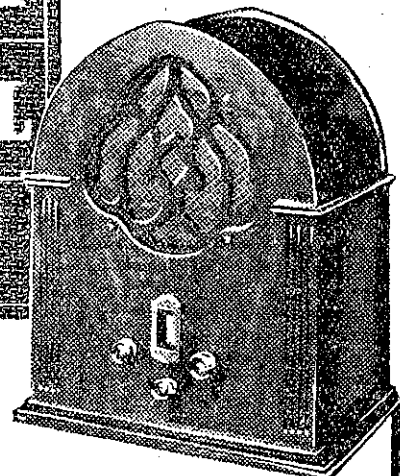
