SUNDAY

From 1YA

The interpretation of this gay duet by these two artists is a fine performance. A humorous sketch, "The Disorderly Room," a very clever burlesque of incidents in army life, will be presented by Tommy Handley and his company.

A CLASSICAL-OPERATIC programme will be broadcast by the Studio Orchestra, under Harold Beck. Phyllis Kinniburgh (pianist) will contribute to the instrumental side of the programme. Lawrence A. North, the possessor of a rich baritone voice, will make his first appearance in 3YA studio to-night, singing "The Prologue" (from "I Pagliacci"), "A Garden is a Lovesome Thing," and "My Abode."
