
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### News and Views of the DX Club

#### Identification Wanted

Foreign station on 1160 k.c. (258 m.), heard on July 30 at 1.25 a.m. at strength Language appeared to be Japanese, but the accompanying music was not the usual heard from those stations .--6MC (Christehurch).

DX26HB: Your station on 1160 k.c. is XGT, China (cannot catch the name of the town). English and Chinese is spoken. "Six Valve" (Christehurch): Your station is undoubtedly HSPI on 856 k.c., and six strokes on a gong are given at intervals. "Radio" (Wellington): Your stations are as follow: (1) XGT, China, 1160 k.c.; (2) XGY, Hangchow, 970 k.c.; (3) HSPI, Bangkok, 856 k.c. It is possible you heard ZBW, Victoria, Hong-Kong, on 845 k.c. More likely to be the former, though. I noticed in this week's "Radio Record" no dxer had answered the previous week's "Identifications Wanted." Here they are: W.M. (Hikurangi): Your first station is VUC, Calcutta, 810 k.c. DX 20HB: Your station is XGY, Hangchow, 970 k.c. R.P.R. (Timaru): Yes, I have heard Bandoeng mentioned. Do not know where the station is, though, Other is XGT.—"Omsk" (Whakatane).
