The albatross, most wonderful of all gliders, and the little petrel (from the Spanish "little Peter," owing to its appearance of walking on the water), are each members of the same family. All the petrels have the same remarkable provision for the nutrition of their young. They stuff them with squid and other sea food till the youngsters can eat no Then the parents leave the young bird to live on its surplus fat and grow feathers. When it gets really hungry it is able to fly and feed itself. A ten-mouths-old still downy albatross weighed on the Crozets tipped the beam at 25lb., though the largest flying albatross scales no more than 16. Then there was the Antarctic petrel, whose young squirt a streem of evil-smelling oily stuff from their throats at all intruders until ammunition runs short.
