

Temporary "Black Out" at 2ZR, Nelson

SHORTLY after eight o'clock on Wednesday evening, the Nelson station, 2ZR, suddenly went off the air, reports our Nelson correspondent. Inquiries showed that the recently-installed condensers had burned out. The secretary of the 2ZR Club explained that, a fortor the 22th club explained that, a variable that ago, two condensers were "blown" on account of the power fluctuations.
