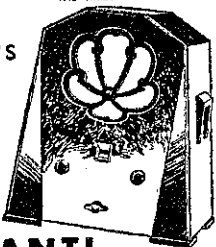

Brahms' Centenary

"Brahms ought to have lived to be a hundred; he only died because he lived too well, because he abused his stomach and his liver. At the restaurant of the 'Red Hedgehog'... he was known as an insatiable glutton. Small of stature, with eyes screwed up and head framed in a bushy beard, an enormous stomach only too revelatory of his excesses.

"From the sentimental point of view the same calm, the same materialism: 'Whom did Brahms love? A lot of servant girls at inns. That counts for nothing. Clara Schumann? That's better; but in any case rather like a mother. Grand passion, unrestrained, furious, all-devouring, shaking the soul to its very foundations, is completely absent from the life of Brahms. For him love was a succession of passing fancies rather than love. He never emerged from the kind of sentimental torpor which he found agreeable.

"Such was the man, and the man explains the musician."

I do not agree with this, because a man's work is almost as often a reaction against his everyday habits as derivative from them. The soul is not infrequently at war with the body, and if Brahms's fleshy appetites were gross it by no means follows that his music was of a piece with them. Still, the point of view expressed in the article is rarely met with in this country and therefore worthy of attention. It is not those who are firm in their faith who ear sceptics and scoffers.
