


#### **Identification Wanted**

American station on 780 k.c., heard Monday, October 2, on dance music. They closed down at 7.30 p.m., N.Z.T., but unfortunately I missed the call sign. Part of their closing announcement was: "Operating on assigned frequency of 780 k.c., by authority of the Federal Radio Commission. — return to the air at 6 a.m. — Good-night." They went off the air at 7.31 p.m., N.Z.T.—"Elgin" (Wanganni).

American station on approximately 750 k.c., which is frequently heard giving talks on "Koran,' a great foreteller." These talks are followed by an announcer who speaks in fast but intelligible American. Also a station on 850 k.c., giving the call KOA—D.D. (Bay of Plenty).

152M.C. (Timaru): European station on 985 k.c. is Bordeaux Lafayette; the one on 941 k.c. is more likely to be Naples than Dresden, as Naples has been very good lately.—1HQ (Invercargill).

#### European Reception Good.

RECEPTION has been very good lately, very little static being present. Europeans are especially good, Moscow, on 707 k.c., being the best, though Vienna, Prague, Rome, Bucharest, Breslau, Milan and Heilsberg also come in well. On Sunday, October 1, I counted no less than 52 stations, including 18 of which I heard only the carriers. American, Australian and Eastern stations are also good, the last-mentioned being heard early in the evenings. Latest verifications are: Brno (making 23 Europeans), KDB, CFCN, and one from WOC for reception at 1 p.m.—"Digger" (Hamilton).

#### Reception Poor.

CONDITIONS for reception during the last fortnight have been poor, owing to excessive QRN, and I have done yery
