Two leading ladies in his work, "Alessandro," were extremely jealous of each other, and one night, on the stage at St. James Theatrethey electrified the audience by stopthey electrified the audience by stopping a duet to engage in a free fight, in which they tore each other's hair and rolled upon the stage.

Praise and blame alternate in the lives of men. Owing to political bitterness engendered by the change of monarchy, Handel fell from grace as suddenly and as rapidly as he rose to prominence. His close allegiance to one Sovereign made him hated by the supporters of another; his operas were boycotted, and he could find neither patronage nor support in England for his great oratorio, the "Messiah." He was probably the most prolific composer of all.
