If a point is vital, it is a good plan to go over it again, or at any rate repeat a word or two. And pauses are very helpful. They allow what you have said to soak in.

"It is a new experience to talk to so large an audience as radio offers, and it is very pleasant to find that what is said is appreciated. Not only people
