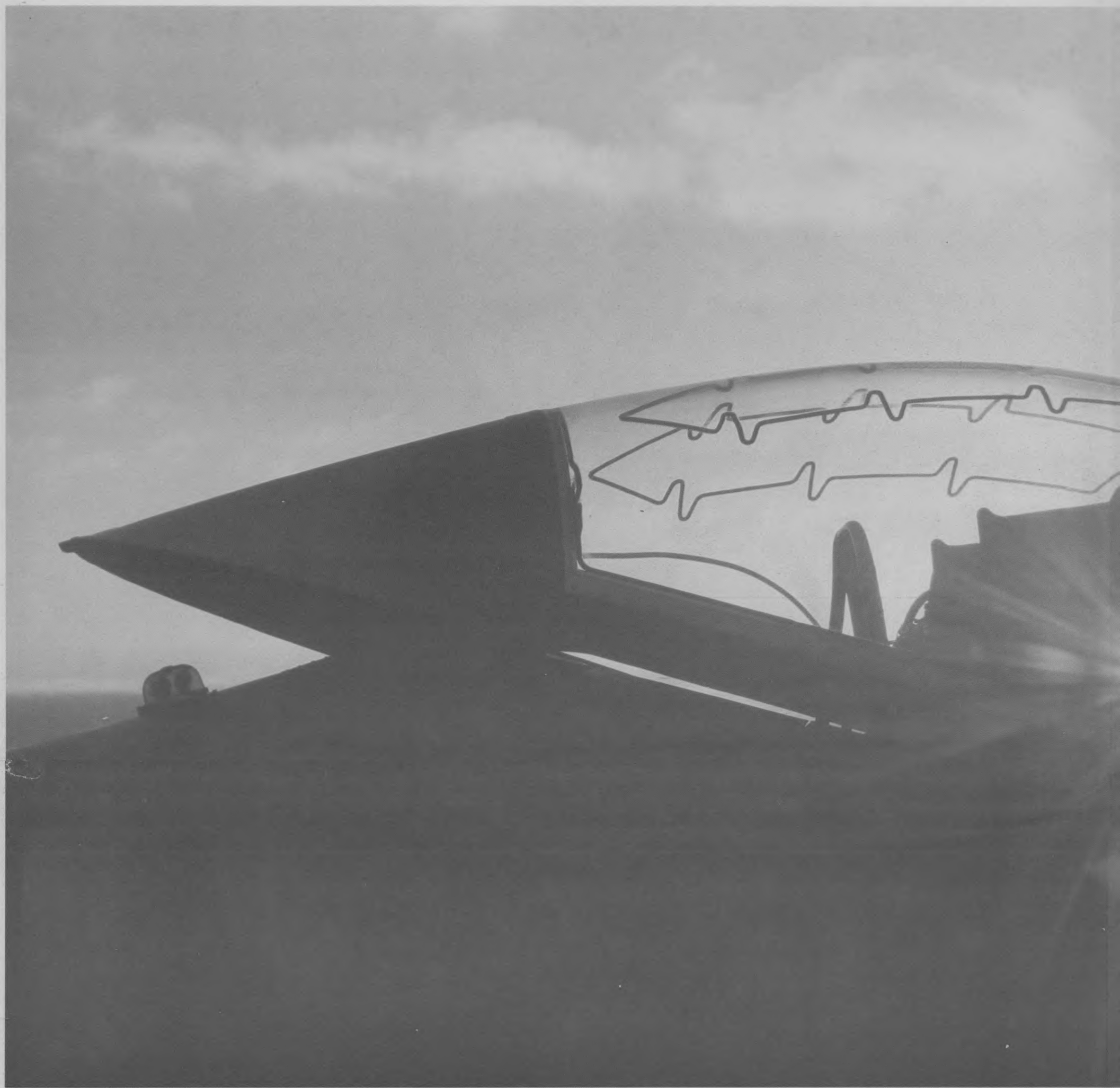




The RNZAF now has a few more
