Springlands, Mrs. J. Eyles; Blenheim, Miss E. Tarrant and Mrs. Knight reported on the work done up to time of disbandment. The President commended the Unions on their activities which showed that the work was well maintained in each Union.

Superintendents Reports were full of interests, it may be possible to help these organisations. The Noontide was observed, Mrs. Mackie taking the prayer. Mrs. Underhill, in her presidential address, spoke on "Opportunity." Lunch was a happy respite, all sitting down at a large table, and justice was done!

The afternoon session was opened with devotions conducted by Mrs. Girling. Two resolutions were passed as follows:

- (1) That this Convention views with grave alarm the Report of the findings of the Royal Licensing Commission and strongly, protests against its recommendations, urging that every possible effort be made to protect the youth of our country by keeping botels closed from six o'clock and preventing alcoholic drinks being sold in restaurants etc., as has been suggested.
- (2) That, realising the urgent necessity, a special Department be set up in our Public Hospitals where special Shock Treatment may be administered to persons with mental disorders, so that they may be saved the stigma of Mental Hospitals, where the treatment is solely used at present.

Many more visitors were welcomed at the afternoon meeting including members from the Springlands-Farnham Women's Institute who entertained with singing several choral pieces and an elocutionary item. Mrs. Mackie was then introduced and she addressed the gathering on "Why are people in prison?" telling of conditions in some of the prisons and of the aspirations of the Howard League in education of the inmates. Mrs. Mackie astounded her listeners as she stated some facts concerning figures and she was accorded a very appreciative vote of thanks for her splendid address.

The election of Officers resulted in the President, Vice-President, Rec. Secretary and Corresponding Secretary being re-elected. Miss Tarrant was elected Treasurer in place of Mrs. Stephens who on account of ill health did not seek re-election. Mrs. Wells, Picton, was appointed "Y" Superin-tendent, Mrs. A. M. Gascoigne, White Ribbon Superintendent, the Evan-gelistic, Peace and L.W.R. Supts. were re-appointed.

Two new members were initiated at the close, while later four subscriptions were received, and others signified their intention and desire to link up.

After votes of thanks having been passed to all who had assisted, the Convention closed with the singing of the Temperance Doxology and afternoon tea was dispensed.

The twenty-third District Convention of the Auckland district opened on Sunday, September 22nd, 1946, with a Church Parade in the Church of Christ, West Street, Newton, Pastor Campbell, Pastor of the Church, conducting the service, between 70 and 80 members attending.

Reception to Delegates.

As reception to delegates was held on Monday in the Convention Hall, which was beautifully decorated with flowers. Mrs. Mountjoy, District President, presided over a large gathering. ber being 404.

The following remits were passed by the Convention (Abbreviated, Ed.):

1. That the plea of being intoxicated when committing a crime should be no excuse or ground for the discharge of the accused.

2. That the penalty should be heavier,

not lighter, in such cases.

3. That the increase of drinking among young people of both sexes, should be dealt with by its being made illegal to sell, wholesale or retail, or to give liquor to any person under twentyone years of age.

4. That letters of congratulation should be sent to the Salvation Army in Auckland and the Presbyterians in Invercargill for their refusal to accept money from the Liquor Trust.

5. That as paper is now plentiful, bread should be wrapped before it

leaves the Bakery.

6. That the amount of liquor being sent to the J. Force is a matter for concern, the suggestion being made that Fruit-juices and soft drinks be given preference.

7. That more severe sentences should be passed, even to the reinstating of flogging for cases of assault on young
