## The Returned Civilian. 5.

"THE Board ( Rehabilitation ) recognises that the successful rehabilitation of ex-servicemen and servicement depends vitally on the post-war reconstruction of New Zealand's economy and social life" This . . Quotation is taken from a statement of the Rehabilitation Board and should receive the serious consideration of allsoldiers now. The quetation emphasises that the "successful rehabilitation " of returned mon and women depends on " reconstruction " of our economic and social life. That cen only mean one of two things : that we return to a M.Z. of less State Enterprise and more Private Unterprises or to a N.Z. of more State Enterprise and loss Private Enterprise. Admitting the need of " reconstruction" we have to make up our minds how we are going to carry it through. A further quotation from the statement says:upon the assumption that a longterm plan of reconstruction involving appropriate industrila, financial and distributive organisation, will be initiated by the Govt. ". Notice: that it is the Govt. that is doing the plane ing; 'private enterprise; it is the a State Dept. that is taking the lead, not a Chamber of Commerce; that there has been no there has been no alternative policy from private enterprise.

Are we to assume that N.Z. as a whole is behind the Gevt. in this matter of rehabilitating returnd soldiers? With woman, so with politics - silence gives consent. That being so, it follows that we must not start bawling for r less Govt. interference, for a getdrn to the " good old days when a man could oall his soul his own " and not raise the price of a feed. Now is the time to examine any plans the Govt. has for "reconstruction"; it is too late when we return. There is no use being pitched cock & bull years when we return; fanning the superstition that private enterprise is the only way - when private enterprise sits mum new - may be good tautics for soms people. Pol-
