## HUMAN BULLET BOOT

LENARD WILLIAM BOOT, better known as the "Human Bullet" is our Engineering Surveyor. "Of the few things I can be sure," he said, one is that I was born in Christchurch 1908. Asked why he was so sure, he replied "because I was there". His early childhood was quiet and placid; no evictions, murders, divorces, or bankruptcies. :::: He learnt (barely) to read and write at the Addington School. There were other things he learnt on the sly (such as the first three verses of his favourite song, the W of J.) but he is very modest on the subject of his somewhat precocious childhood. After leaving school he entered the Lands & Survey Dept. Here he first displayed the characteristic that has marked his subsequent career: his developed gift of speed. (He can walk from his tent to the showers in a quarter of an hour) From 1925 when he sped into the Lands & Survey the years raced by until by peaceful penetration he landed in the Forestry Dept., Lands & Survey were left far behind. Here he remained ten years. "Yes, ten long years passed and I didn't know. The buggers", he says, kept me inside when I was so keen to get out into the open spaces. Why, my hobby was tramp-ing and deer stalking! I once very nearly got into trouble when I went out to get on a deer. However, trouble or no trouble, the "Human Bullet" broke in<sup>o</sup> the P.W.D. in 1937, the "year of the Great Boom". The great-est Dept. in the N.Z. Public Service. "And we do a Public Service; making roads, bridges, hydro-electric schemes, huge buildings and railways (which the Railways Dept. kid they make). Only in Works Service N.Z.E. does he find the zest for Public Welfare exceeded. "The way the CSM gets me out into the parade in the mornings shows that he too is a highly spirited public thinking man, and if I'm going to make the grade, I'll have to pull my finger out. There are many other interesting facts of my life, but I must go, I must - the 'Old Man' knows how I move and I don't want to let my reputation suffer! And that reputation is summed up in ..." THE gong goes, then simultaneously an impenetrable fog of dust issues from tent 5 H.Q. lines. As the dust clears, a statue like figure is seen at the head of the Parade - that's Lenard William Boot, "The Human Bullet!"

another Engineering Unit, or A.S.C., or any other Unit in need of qualified men. :::: X 3 List consists of all personnel undergoing refresher courses in Detention Barracks, Deserter's, and P.O.W's. X 5 List includes all personnel who are on course of over 14 days. X 6 List (which will not interest us) is the list on which all personnel going to N.Z. on leave, compassionate, etc, or furlough <sup>are placed</sup> are sub-lists such as X4a List which is for personnel without previous affiliations in N.Z.E.F.I.P. An X4c List made up of Grade 2 men posted for Base duties in New Guinea Area. There are other Lists, but they do not concern us. The main thing " concluded Sgt. Foster, " is to remember that a man on an X List is no longer a member of his Unit and that he will not necessarily be reposed to his Unit on discharge from hospital. " :::: With that we folded up our notebook and enquired how Sgt. Foster's chest was improving. " Still pretty sore, after the extra effort I put in to be ready to help the class put up the Boilers ..... some people don't appreciate what the effort meant to us " he sadly said. We offered our sympathy - after all a chest is a chest !

THE MARQUESAS.

MARQUESAS - a small group of islands lying 740 miles northeast of Tahiti

THEY - consist of eleven islands  
- three large and eight small.

IN 1840 - the populations was  
around the 100.000. Today it barely  
numbers 2.500.

AREA - total area is 490 square miles. The principal islands are:-

HIVA-OA, 23 miles long by 11 broad. It is well watered and has, like other islands in group, an excellent climate where almost anything can be grown. Features of the island are : - Atunoa valley and a plateau, a thousand feet high. Mt. Temetiu, 4,000 is the highest mountain. It was on this island that Paul Gauguin, famous French artist, lived, died and was buried.

MUKUHIVA - 20 miles long and 12 wide, contains 47 square miles. Lies 70 miles to north of Hiva-oa. Very rich land, broad well watered valleys, lying between broad and well watered bush-clad hills. Once an important spot where Bishops and Governors' resided. Now desolate.

FATUHLIVA - most southerly of group. Chief harbour is Oomoa. Rocky and forbidding coast, has mountains in interior rising to 3,000 feet.

TAHUATA - lies close to Hiva-oa and most notable as place where French first gained footing in 1841.. The native chief, Ioete, not being able to maintain order invited French to assist him : they did by helping themselves to the islands. The group now part of France's Colonial Empire.

OTHER - islands are smaller, in some mountains rise to 3,000 feet. All are noted for rich land, good climate and profusion of tropical fruit.

HERMAN Melville's book, "Typee" describes Marquesas Life. We recommend the book and have a copy which may be borrowed.

ROBERT LOUIS STEVENSON - writing on the Islands said :- " The history of the Marquesas is.... much confused by the coming and going of the French. At least twice they have seized the archipelago and at least once deserted it and in the meanwhile the natives pursued, almost without interr-

uption, their desultory cannibal war

Ho and other writers comment on the enormous harm done to the natives by the introduction of opium.

IN his book, "White Shadows Over The South Seas", O'Brien, writes :-

" The story of the Marquesas is one of the most tragic and sorrowful in the history of the South Seas. We Europeans can feel nothing but shame as we contemplate the record - even as we are acknowledging that there are wonderful opportunities awaiting in the Marquesas for the colonists who can take the place of the dead and dying Polynesians ..... The white man brought the Chinese, and with them leprosy. The Chinese were imported to aid the white man in stealing the native land of the Marquesans and to keep the Chinese contented, opium was brought with him. Finding it eagerly craved by the ignorant native, the foolish white fastened this vice also upon his other desired slave. The French Govt., for forty thousand francs, licensed an opium farmer to sell the drug still faster, and not until alarmed by the results and shamed by the outcry in Europe, did it forbid the devastating narcotic. Too late ! Health and happiness were destroyed because the white man came here to gratify his cupidity. The priest could bring no inspiration sufficient to overcome the degradation caused by the traders. The Marquesans saw that Jesus had small influence over their rulers. Civilisation lost its opportunity because it gave precept, but no example."

".....The Marquesans were among the most handsome and charming people in the South Seas - magnificent physical specimens; and they were literally preyed upon by all the most evil elements among the wandering Europeans. The men were taught opium smoking and alcohol - the women were debauched. Disease went through their ranks like wild-fire --- they literally died in masses " .
