

tion tactics or otherwise endeavours to force the Government from its determined course, then that section is definitely interfering with the prosecution of the War and embarrassing this country in its relations with the Mother Country, other Dominions and our Allies.

I fear there is grave danger of our thoughtlessly permitting the real issue to become obscured. The War is far from won - and unless it is won there is a sorry future before this country. It cannot be won without universal and combined effort - which in turn involves personal sacrifice and personal hardship.

Let's get jingoistic again - past progress has shown that there's something to it and I refuse to believe that there is no longer such a thing as Love of Country. We are all prepared to suffer for what we love. In all consistency then let us get on with the War and have done with it for the sake of our country and our families who hope to live in it in happiness and comfort when Peace comes.

I earnestly hope that the "Papakura Parade" will always foster that aim.
